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Ohio's Community Behavioral Health System

- Ohio's community behavioral health system is made up of partnerships and contracts among the Ohio Department of Mental Health (ODMH), Ohio Department of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services (ODADAS), 53 local county boards and more than 600 local provider organizations.
- The community mental health system provides treatment and recovery support services for people with mental illness. Services are provided in two ways: at the community level in various settings including clinics, residential settings, schools, nursing homes, jails, homeless shelters and others through contracts with county boards and other health and human services payers/funders; and through six public regional psychiatric hospitals operated by ODMH.

Ohio's Community Behavioral Health System

- The alcohol and drug addiction system providers prevention, treatment and recovery services for individuals with substance use disorder treatment needs.
- The primary sources of funding for the community behavioral health system include Medicaid, local tax levies, state general revenue funds and federal block grant funds (by far the largest is for substance abuse prevention and treatment).
- Medicaid enrollees are entitled to certain mental health and addiction services. Uninsured and underinsured patients' eligibility varies across service areas depending on the availability of local funds and the demand for services. Not all services are provided by all organizations.

Ohio's Community Behavioral Health System

- In 2010, the community mental health system provided care to approximately 360,000 individuals, including 120,000 children.
- In SFY 2011, the alcohol and drug addiction system provided prevention services to 2.2 million Ohioans and treatment services to 99,000 Ohioans.
- Service array potentially available to individuals and families across the lifespan include:



Ohio's Community Behavioral Health System

- The total number of mental health certified/licensed providers
 - 402 (main provider sites; count does not include satellite locations)
 - 297 of these organizations are nationally accredited and have Medicaid provider agreements
 - 148 ODMH licensed residential units - includes 1022 child/adolescents beds and 936 adult beds
 - Total number of ACF/AFoH: 470 Family Homes; 245 Group Homes; 72 Foster Homes
 - The total number of alcohol and other drug services providers
 - 219 corporations (by FTID) that have Medicaid provider agreements for AoD Medicaid services
 - Total certified ODADAS community sites:
 - Detoxification: 25
 - Residential: 85
 - Halway House: 40
 - Methadone: 12
 - Outpatient: 607 (includes main site and satellite locations)
 - Driver Intervention Program: 184
 - Prevention: 192
